Equipped with an embedded operating system, it offers camera capacity, features, and functionality exceeding other DVRs. The DX4500/DX4600 is designed for the entry-level market with 8 or 16 camera inputs; greater internal hard drive storage capacity; fast frame rate recording; and powerful playback, search, and export capabilities. The DX4500/DX4600 not only replaces the traditional VCR and multiplexer combination, but it also offers the benefits derived from the latest in digital video processing.

Designed to work with today's broadband networks, the DX4500/DX4600 uses MPEG-4 compression that allows you to view and control the DVR across local or wide area networks. Recording at resolutions of up to 704 x 480 (4CIF), the DX4500/DX4600 captures crystal clear pictures, creating effective footage for later use. Exported video is easily reviewed at the DX4500/DX4600 server or using the Export Viewer application. Each DVR input channel can be configured individually to meet a specific security application requirement for video retention. Video critical to investigation and archiving is easily exported to a USB memory device or to an optional CD-RW or DVD±RW device.

Operation of the unit is made easy through the front panel, remote control keypad, or USB mouse. The remote DX4500/DX4600 Client application can interface with as many as sixteen DX4500/DX4600 servers simultaneously. User-configurable disk partitioning is used to allocate specific hard disk space for storing continuous video data and event-initiated video data, which can have different retention times.

For surveillance applications requiring pan/tilt/zoom (PTZ) capability, the DX4500/DX4600 addresses and controls PTZ equipment such as Spectra<sup>®</sup> domes and Esprit<sup>®</sup> positioning systems, or third-party cameras. An optional Pelco KBD300A keyboard can be connected to the DX4500/DX4600 to operate PTZ devices. The DX4500/DX4600 supports Pelco C (Coaxitron<sup>®</sup>), Pelco D, and Pelco P protocols. Pelco C allows you to operate Pelco PTZ cameras up to distances of 1,500 feet (457m).

With the ability to trigger recording and response to events (such as alarm inputs, motion detection, and video loss), the DX4500/DX4600 Series becomes an automated monitoring system as well. The DX4600 Series DVR supports multi-event recording. Multi-event recording includes any single event or combination of events associated with an alarm, motion, or instant recording. The DX4600 allows you to schedule each camera to record in a single- or multiple-event mode across a 24-hour timeline. You can also configure each camera to record at a specific resolution, quality, and image rate when an event is triggered.

The DX4500/DX4600 video outputs provide for efficient control and effective deterrence. The choice of VGA or composite main monitor output provides flexibility for the user. The main monitor output can be adjusted to display one, four, nine, or sixteen cameras, or it can be adjusted for a custom display. The DX4500/DX4600's spot monitor output can be used for public viewing or alarm call-up.

- Remote Client software application: Allows you to log on to, operate, and administer up to sixteen DX4500/DX4600 server systems simultaneously from a remote location. This display can consist of multiple DX4500/DX4600 servers and one DX4004 server. The DX4500/DX4600 supports a total of five simultaneous connections when using the client and Web client applications. For more information about the remote client software application, refer to the DX4500/DX4600 Client Operation and Programming manual.
- Export Viewer: Allows you to view exported video. It is designed to recognize and verify the digital watermark that is embedded in the Pelco engineered DX4500/DX4600 \*.exp video format.
- **Emergency Agent:** Works with networked DX4500/DX4600 DVRs to alert users when one or more channels detect a motion or alarm event. The emergency agent runs on a networked client PC.
- Web Client: Allows you to view live video and operate PTZ features of cameras attached to a DX4500/DX4600. When used with the client software application, the DX4500/DX4600 supports five simultaneous connections and can monitor up to 16 cameras remotely.

# **Application Window**

The DX4500/DX4600 application window provides a user-friendly graphical user interface (GUI) that allows you to operate and configure the system through the front panel, remote control, or mouse. Configuration of the unit is accomplished through the setup window. The application window toolbar provides quick access to all of the operational controls to view, record, playback, search and copy/backup video data.



Figure 1. Application Window


1 View Panels: Displays live and playback video from attached cameras. The DVR supports up to 16 view panes.

Status Icons: Displays the status of the camera's current operating modes:

- **PTZ icon** : Indicates that the channel is configured for PTZ operation.
- Audio icon (): Indicates that the channel is configured for audio operation.
- No record icon (C): Indicates that video is not being recorded.
- Normal icon (N): Indicates that the normal recording mode is active.
- Alarm record icon (A): Indicates that alarm event recording mode is active.

Motion record icon M: Indicates that motion event recording mode is active.

3 Channel Label: Displays the input channel number (01–08 or 01–16) and the assigned channel name.



5 Red Border: Indicates the selected channel.

6 Toolbar: GUI toolbar through which the DVR is operated and configured.

# **GUI Toolbar**

The DX4500/DX4600 GUI toolbar is used to access the setup menus, dialog boxes, and controls that allow you to operate and configure the DVR. You can use the USB mouse to easily and quickly change settings and operate the system. You can also operate the DX4500/DX4600 from the front panel and remote control to perform the same functions. A client software application running on a computer allows you to remotely operate and perform administrative tasks on the DVR.




Figure 3. Camera Menu HDD Partition Notification

# **PTZ Control**

The PTZ control is available for cameras that support PTZ functions using Pelco C, Pelco P, and D protocols. It is also available for supported thirdparty dome cameras. In addition, the PTZ option must be enabled and a protocol must be assigned to the camera channel. For information about configuring camera features, refer to <u>Camera Menu Setup</u> on page 27. For information using the KBD300A keyboard to operate PTZ devices, refer to <u>Activating Presets</u> on page 100.

NOTE: When operating third-party cameras, the PTZ control supports the up, down, left, right, zoom in, and zoom out functions.




Figure 5. Front Panel

[2] OSD: Toggles on and off the display of the toolbar.

- [3] COPY: Copies recorded video data to the target media.
- [4] MARK: Sets the beginning point from which to search recorded data.
- [5] FOCUS-: Selects camera 5 or decreases camera focus.

[6] FOCUS+: Increases camera focus.

[7] IRIS-: Close camera iris.

[9] ALM OFF: Selects camera 9 or turns off active alarm state.

[10] INFO: Toggles on and off the display of system information.

- [11] LOG: Toggles on and off the display of the log list.
- [12] AUX: Sends an auxiliary command.
- **[13] SET:** Starts the PTZ programming mode.
- [14] CLR: Clears a programmed event.

[15] PATTERN: Assigns the recorded PTZ actions to the user-specified pattern number.

[16] PRESET: Assigns the position of the selected camera to a user-specified preset number.

**3 Remote Sensor:** Communicates between the DVR and remote control.

#### 4 System Status Indicators:

- NET: Is lit when the network is connected.
- **BACKUP:** Is lit when the backup process is active.
- HDD: Blinks when the hard drive is accessed.
- ALARM: Is lit when the alarm out is in progress.
- 5 Selection Control:
  - Directional Arrows: (Up, down, left, and right) Navigate between the options of the Menu, Options, and Properties panes.
  - Enter: Selects the highlighted option in the Menu, Option, and Properties panes.

- Reverse: Searches recorded video at normal speed. Repeatedly press the button to search recorded video in the reverse direction at 2x, 3x, or 4x the normal speed.
- **Reverse Skip:** Activates when playback is paused. Press the button to play back video frame-by-frame, or press the button repeatedly to quickly skip through video in the reverse direction. Press and hold the button to go directly to the beginning of the recorded video.

Right Arrow: Provides two functions.

- **Forward:** Searches recorded video at normal speed. Repeatedly press the button to search recorded video in the forward direction at 2x, 3x, or 4x the normal speed.
- Forward Skip: Activates when playback is paused. Press the button to search video frame-by-frame, or press the button repeatedly to quickly skip through video in the forward direction. Press and hold the button to go directly to the end of the recorded video.

STOP: Stops playback.

PAUSE: Pauses playback.

**Play:** Provides an alternate playback function for viewing video. Press to start playback in forward direction; press again to play back video in the reverse direction.

Jog Control (inner dial): Navigates through various mode options.

- Menu Mode: Increases (clockwise) or decreases (counter-clockwise) the selected option values.
- Date/Time Search Mode: Increases (clockwise) or decreases (counter-clockwise) to select the start time from which to begin
  playback. Played back video is displayed in the picture-in-picture view. The picture-in-picture view is displayed in one or four
  panes.
- Event Search Mode: During the initial video playback mode, the inner jog dial does not change the playback parameters. Once the shuttle dial is used to pause played back video, the inner jog allows you to search forward (clockwise) or backward (counter-clockwise) through each frame.
- Bookmark Search Mode: Once the shuttle dial is used to pause played back video, the jog dial allows you to search forward (clockwise) or backward (counter-clockwise) through each frame.
- Pixel Search Mode: In the pixel search setup view, the jog dial navigates through the options. Once an option is selected, the jog dial increases (clockwise) or decreases (counter-clockwise) the option's value.

Shuttle Dial (outer ring):

- Quick Lift and Release Action (clockwise or counter-clockwise): For any of the above search modes, the initial quick
  lift and release of the shuttle causes the played back video to pause. Subsequent quick lift and release actions searches the
  played back video in the forward (clockwise) or reverse (counter-clockwise) direction, one frame at a time.
- Turn and Hold Action (clockwise or counter-clockwise): Turn the shuttle a little further to search the played back video in the forward (clockwise) or reverse (counter-clockwise) direction faster, frame-by-frame. Turning the shuttle a full rotation in either direction searches the playback at the fastest rate. The playback returns to pause when the shuttle is released.

**LOGIN:** Displays the login dialog box if a user is not logged on to the system. If a user is already logged on, pressing this button logs off the user. When a user is logged on, the button is lit blue; when a user is not logged on, the button is not lit. This button performs

the same function as the Login icon 📕 on the toolbar.



#### **Monitor Selection:**

- Main: Displays the Selecting Starting Channel dialog box, to select the window presentation as viewed on the VGA or main analog monitor. Use in conjunction with buttons 1-8 or 1-16, to select which camera input is displayed first on the VGA or main analog monitor. This button performs the same function as the MAIN icon on the GUI toolbar.
- VGA monitor selection: If the main video is displayed on the analog monitor, use the MAIN button to switch the display of to the VGA monitor. Press the MAIN button for approximately 5 seconds until the system sounds a beep and restarts.
- **SPOT:** Displays the Selecting Starting Channel dialog box, to select the window presentation as viewed on a spot monitor. • Use in conjunction with buttons 1–8 or 1–16 to configure the first camera displayed. This button performs the same function as the SPOT icon on the GUI toolbar.
- Analog Main BNC output: If the main video is displayed on the VGA monitor, use the SPOT button to switch the display to • the analog monitor connected to MAIN-OUT BNC.

**PTZ:** Displays the PTZ dialog box for a camera configured for PTZ control. This button performs the same function as the PTZ icon

on the GUI toolbar. 1.1




Figure 6. Remote Control

- If the DVR is turned on but a user is not logged on, the message "You have to login first" appears.
- If a user is already logged on, the message "Please enter the password" appears. If there is no activity for a period of time, the dialog box disappears.

#### 2 Channel Selection:

- MAIN: Displays the Selecting Starting Channel dialog box, to select the window presentation as viewed on the VGA or main analog monitor. Use in conjunction with buttons 1–8 or 1–16 to configure the first camera input displayed on the VGA or main analog (MAIN-OUT BNC) monitor. This button performs the same function as the MAIN icon on the GUI toolbar.
- **SPOT:** Displays the Selecting Starting Channel dialog box, to select the window presentation as viewed on a spot monitor. Use in conjunction with buttons 1–8 or 1–16 to configure the first camera input is displayed. This button performs the same



3 LOGIN: Displays the login dialog box if a user is not logged on to the system. If a user is logged on, pressing this button logs the user out. ALM.OFF: Turns off an active alarm for the selected camera. Also cancels alarm activation and returns the system to the condition before the alarm was activated.

MENU/ESC: Toggles on and off the display of the setup menu.

- **AUX:** Sends an auxiliary command to the specified PTZ camera.
- CLR: Clears a programmed event.
- SET: Starts the PTZ programming mode.
- **PATTERN:** Assigns the recorded PTZ actions to the user-specified pattern number.
- **PRESET:** Assigns the position of the selected camera to a user-specified preset number.
- 1 Numbers 0 to 9: Used to assign the system ID, PTZ preset and pattern numbers, auxiliary command, and select the camera channel in the search mode.
- **MARK:** Sets the starting location from which to conduct a search.
- **COPY:** Copies the specified recorded data to an external device.
- **0SD:** Toggles on and off the display of the system toolbar.

**ID:** Sets the appropriate DVR system ID through which to operate. Press the ID button, and then press the number button (within two seconds) to select the system ID of the DVR. If you set the system ID to 0 (zero), you can control multiple DVRs at the same time.

# **Virtual Keyboard**

The DX4500/DX4600 provides a virtual on-screen keyboard to perform the following:

- Select a user name and type the a password to log on or off of the DVR.
- Create camera names.
- Create holiday schedule names.
- Assign TCP/IP settings (IP address, subnet mask, and so forth).
- Set up mail accounts.
- Assign emergency agent IP addresses.
- Create user accounts.

Figure 7 describes the Login Virtual Keyboard and its functions. All DX4500/DX4600 virtual keyboards operate similarly, but display different fields depending on the task being performed.

**OK/Cancel:** Accepts or cancels the performed action in fields 1 and 2.

# **Turning On and Logging On to the DVR**

You must log on to the DX4500/DX4600 with a valid user name (ID) and password to operate the DVR. User names and passwords are case sensitive. By default, the DX4500/DX4600 comes with one login account; the user name is admin and the default password is admin.

**NOTE:** If you are logging on for the first time, the system does not prompt you to change the default (ADMINISTRATOR) password. If you keep the default password, access to the DVR is easily accomplished by anyone who knows the user name (ID) and default password. Therefore, Pelco strongly recommends that the system administrator change the password and keep it in a secured location. (The user name or access level, which by default is Administrator, cannot be changed.)

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press and hold the power button 🕐 until your hear a beep, and then release the button. After a few seconds, the DX4500/DX4600 startup screen is displayed.

3. On the front panel or remote control, press Login. Using the mouse, click the Login icon 👗 . The Login dialog box opens. Use the virtual keyboard to enter the password.

The password has the following guidelines:

- Characters: A to Z, a to z, numerals 0 to 9, and special characters.
- Name Length: From 4 to 8 characters long.

By default, the letters on the virtual keyboard are lowercase (a to z). It also uses numerals 0 to 9, and special characters.

- 4. To enter the default password, do one of the following:
  - On the front panel or remote control, press the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a**  $\nabla$  to select "a" from the virtual keyboard, and then press ENTER. Repeat this process to select the remaining characters.
  - Using the mouse, click each character of the password.

An asterisk appears in the Password entry box.

5. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  b  $\land$  to select OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse,

click OK. The system logs you on and the Login icon 🙎 changes color, indicating that you have successfully logged on to the DVR.

# Logging Off and Turning Off the DVR

On the front panel or remote control, press LOGIN. Using the mouse, click the Login icon 👗 . The Login icon changes from blue to black, indicating you are logged off.

You must be logged on to the DVR with administrator level permission to turn off the DX4500/DX4600.

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press and hold the power switch () until you hear a beep.
  - If you are not logged on with administrator level permission, do the following:
    - (1) Log on at the administrator level.
    - (2) Press and hold the power switch () until you hear a beep.

The Login virtual keyboard opens. You have approximately 25 seconds to enter the password before it closes.

- 2. To enter the password, do one of the following:
  - On the front panel or remote control, press the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a**  $\checkmark$  to select the password character on the virtual keyboard, and then press ENTER. Repeat this process until you have entered every character of the password.
  - With the mouse click each password character on the virtual keyboard.

Asterisks representing each password character are displayed in the Password field.

3. On the front panel or remote control, press the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a**  $\nabla$  to select OK, and then press ENTER. On the toolbar, click OK with the mouse. The system turns off.

# **Setup Window**

The DX4500/DX4600 comes preconfigured with system defaults that allow you to immediately begin using the DVR to view live video. For a description of all of the system defaults, refer to DX4500/DX4600 Factory Defaults on page 129.

The DX4500/DX4600 Setup window allows you to configure the DX4500/DX4600 operation for your particular security application. Only administrator-level users have permission to access the Setup window and configure the DVR.




Figure 10. Camera Menu HDD Partition Notification

WARNING: Before you use the DX4500/DX4600 to record video, refer to Figure 10 and read the HDD Partition Notification.

#### **NAVIGATING THE SETUP WINDOW**

- 1. Log on to the DVR at the administrator level. The DVR application window and toolbar are displayed.
- On the front panel, press the MENU/ESC button or press the MENU/ESC button or the remote control. Using the mouse, click the Setup icon . By default, the Setup window opens and the Camera menu is selected. Figure 11 describes how the Setup window is organized and explains how to navigate the Menu, Option, and Properties panes to change settings.




Figure 12. Camera Menu

- Name: Allows you to create a unique name for each camera. The camera name has the following guidelines:
  - Characters: A to Z, a to z, numerals 0 to 9, and special characters.
  - Name length: Up to 13 characters.
- **Covert:** Allows a camera to be configured, viewed, and operated by users who are logged on with administrator level permission. In the covert mode, if a user is logged on with power or normal level permission, Video Loss is displayed in live view.
- Audio: Associates the audio input (1-4 [DX4516/DX4616] or 1-2 [DX4508/DX4608]) with a specified camera input.
- Disable: The camera can be enabled or disabled from displaying video.

- 3. To create a camera name, do the following:
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse, click CH 01. The channel 01 name box is highlighted.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight a channel, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click a channel name box. the "Please enter the channel name" virtual keyboard opens.

c. To delete the existing name, on the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons ┥ 🕨 🔺 🔻 to highlight the

backspace key |  $\leftarrow$  |, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click the backspace key |  $\leftarrow$  | until the name is deleted.

- d. To type a name using the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  by  $\land$  to highlight a character from the virtual keyboard, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click a character. The selected character is displayed in the channel name box.
- e. Repeat step d until the camera name is typed in the channel name box.
- f. To confirm the entry using the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a v** to highlight OK. Using the mouse, click OK. The camera name is displayed in name box.
- g. Repeat steps 2 and 3 to name other cameras.
- 4. To configure a camera for covert operation, perform steps 4a to 4d for each camera designated for covert operation.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons ▲▼ to highlight a channel number. Then press the left/right arrow buttons ◀ ▶ to highlight the covert settings box and press ENTER. Using the mouse, click a settings box. The covert box changes color.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons 
    Using the mouse, right- or left-click the settings box to toggle the convert setting to ON.
  - c. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse click in another settings box. The covert box changes color.
  - d. Repeat steps 3a–3c to configure other cameras for covert operation.
  - e. When an administrator-level user is logged on to the unit, video from covert cameras displays on the spot monitor. If you do not want video to display on the spot monitor, refer to Display Menu Setup on page 49 and perform the steps to configure the spot monitor for covert operation.
- 5. To configure the audio and disable setting, do the following:
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, use the up/down arrow buttons  $\mathbf{A} \mathbf{\nabla}$ , the left/right arrow buttons  $\mathbf{\blacktriangleleft} \mathbf{\triangleright}$ , and the ENTER button to highlight and change the audio and disable setting for the respective channels.
- 6. To exit the properties settings and return to the Options pane, do the following:
  - a. On the front panel, press the MENU/ESC button or press the MENU/ESC button 💭 on the remote control. Using the mouse, click Properties.

### **VIDEO ADJUSTMENT**

The video adjustment option allows you to set the characteristics (brightness, contrast, and color) of displayed video, and how it is recorded and stored for each camera.

1. From the options pane, on the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **v** to highlight Video Adjustment. Using the mouse, click Video Adjustment. The Video Adjustment option is highlighted and the property settings are displayed.

- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse, click Channel. The Channel 01 name box is highlighted.
- 3. Use the front panel, remote control, or mouse to select a channel. Adjust the brightness, contrast, and color of the display on the monitor. Be sure to preview the video display in the preview window before finalizing your selection.
- 4. Repeat step 3 for each camera for which you want to adjust the video output display.
- 5. To reset the settings for the current channel using the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight "Restore to Default", and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click Restore to Default. The setting for the current channels are reset to the factory defaults.
- 6. To accept the settings and exit Video Adjustment, press the MENU/ESC button on the front panel or press the MENU/ESC button on the remote control. Using the mouse, click Video Adjustment. The Video Adjustment option is highlighted.

#### PTZ SETUP

PTZ devices are connected to the DX4500/DX4600 using the DATA 1 and DATA 2 RS-422/RS-485 ports located on the back of the unit. The DX4508/DX4608 supports up to 8 serial PTZ cameras; the DX4516/DX4616 supports up to 16 serial PTZ cameras. Multiple PTZ cameras are connected by daisy-chaining the camera connections. The DX4500/DX4600 allows you to address and control multiple PTZ cameras individually.

**NOTE:** You might experience operational issues when a camera device is not correctly terminated. When connecting camera devices, use a normal load termination of 75 ohms. When looping through DVR inputs, ensure that the signal is terminated at the end device. For additional information about terminating a specific camera device, refer to the device's installation manual.

Before you perform the PTZ setup procedure, you will need the following information for each PTZ camera being configured:

- Channel to which the PTZ camera is attached
- Data port to which the camera is connected
- Pelco D and Pelco P address
- Camera protocol
- Communication settings: Baud rate, parity, data bits, and stop bits




Figure 16. PTZ Camera Information

  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse click Channel. The Channel property is highlighted.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER, or click in the settings box. The channel settings box changes color.
  - c. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons 
    . Using the mouse, right- or left-click the settings box to display the channels.
  - d. When the channel you want to configure is displayed, do one of the following:
    - On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. The settings box changes color.
    - Using the mouse, click Port. The channel settings box changes color and the Port property is highlighted.
- 3. To set the PTZ port for the current channel and camera, do the following:
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$  to highlight Port. If using the mouse and the Port property is not highlighted, click Port. The Port option is highlighted.

# **Schedule Menu Setup**

The DX4500/DX4600 provides a flexible scheduling feature that allows you to create daily, weekly, and holiday schedules. Recording schedules are easily created for each channel and changed without affecting the schedule of other channels. Up to 10 different holiday schedules can be created. In this case, if a holiday schedule occurs on the same date as a weekday schedule, the holiday schedule will override the weekday schedule. You can also initiate the manual record mode, which takes precedence over the current recording schedule. The DX4500/DX4600 supports copying schedules between channels, days, weekdays, and weekends.

The DX4500/DX4600 supports the five different color-coded scheduling modes:

- No record (white): The video is displayed, but does not record video.
- Normal (green): The DVR records video data continuously over a 24-hour period. This mode uses the most hard disk storage.
- Alarm (red): The DVR only records video if an alarm event is detected.
- Motion (blue): The DVR only records video if a motion event is detected.
- Multi-event recording: Only the DX4600 supports multi-event recording. For information about configuring DX4600 channels for multi-event recording, refer to Multi-Event Recording Setup on page 35.
  - Alarm or motion (yellow): The DVR only records video data if either an alarm or motion event is detected.
  - Normal or Alarm (green and red): The DVR records normal video data until an alarm event is detected, and then switches to
    recording alarm video data.
  - Normal or motion (green and blue): The DVR records normal video data until a motion event is detected, and then switches to
    recording motion video data.
  - Normal, alarm, or motion (green and yellow): The DVR records normal video data until an alarm or motion event is detected, and then switches to recording video for the detected event.
- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **AV** to highlight the Schedule menu. Using the mouse, click the Schedule menu. The schedule options are displayed.




Figure 22. Schedule Menu




Figure 26. Highlighting a Day's Schedule

#### **CREATING A HOLIDAY SCHEDULE**

There are two ways to create a holiday schedule:

- Assign a date and name to the blank schedule
- Edit the blank schedule to configure the channel recording schedule
- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press **V** to highlight Holiday, or with the mouse, click Holiday. The Holiday option is highlighted and the schedule grid is displayed. By default, the Holiday schedule is set to no record.




Figure 31. Selecting the Holiday Option




Figure 37. Holiday Option Schedule Grid




Figure 39. Holiday Schedule




Figure 43. Display Menu




Figure 52. Selecting the View Window




Figure 53. Define and Select a Motion View Area

For more information about the remote client software application, refer to the DX4500/DX4600 Client Operation and Programming manual.
- Web client applications: Allows you to view live video and operate pan, tilt, and zoom (PTZ) features of cameras attached to a DX4500/ DX4600. You can remotely monitor up to 16 cameras from the DX4500/DX4600. The DX4500/DX4600 supports a total five simultaneous connections when using the client and Web client applications.
- Network Time Protocol (NTP): Allows you to use a public or private time server.
- Software update over the network: Allows you to update the server software over the network.
- **Mail notification:** Sends e-mail notification if an event occurs. For example, if an alarm or motion is detected, you will receive a notification that the administrator level password has been changed and so forth.
- Emergency Agent: Installed as part of the Client application, this application works with DX4500/DX4600 servers. If a server unit detects an event (alarm, motion, disk full, administrator password change, and so forth), an event message is sent to the Emergency Agent. The message displays for 5 seconds in the lower-right area of the remote client PC screen.

The DX4500/DX4600 must be turned on, connected to a network, and you must be logged on at the administrator level to configure network software settings. You must restart the DVR for the network configuration changes to take effect. Be sure you are not recording video that cannot be interrupted before you change network settings.




Figure 56. Network Menu

    - **Gateway:** Enter the IP address for the Internet gateway server. On smaller systems, this will be the IP address of the DX4500/ DX4600. On larger systems, there might be a gateway server.
    - Primary DNS Server: Verify the name of the dynamic domain name system (DDNS).
    - Secondary DNS Server: Enter the IP address of the backup domain name system (DNS) server that the DX4500/DX4600 will use to convert names to IP addresses. This server is used if the primary DNS server fails. If you intend to use the DDNS server, you do not need to enter a DNS server.
    - **TCP/IP Port:** The default port number is 9001.
    - Web Server Port: Enter the port number that the Web client will use to communicate with the DX4500/DX4600 over the Internet. The default port number is 80.

**WARNING:** If you use the Web client to access the DX4500/DX4600 and you change the port number, you must update the IP address or the Web address to include the new port number. For example, the revised IP address would be http://192.168.0.40:8080, where 8080 is the revised port number.

• **Bandwidth Throttle:** Select the network bandwidth throttle to limit the amount of network resources allocated to client connections. The default bandwidth throttle is 10 Mbps.

#### DDNS

The DX4500/DX4600 Dynamic DNS (DDNS) feature uses the services provided by No-IP<sup>™</sup>. Prior registration with No-IP is required before configuring the DVR.

The DDNS feature uses port 8245 provided by No-IP (http://www.no-ip.com/). In this case, if the DVR is installed in a network that has a firewall, port 8245 has to be opened to allow DDNS data to get through the firewall. For information about setting up the firewall, refer to your network administrator or network service provider.

- 1. In the Setup window, on the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **V** to select the Network menu option. Using the mouse, click the Network menu option. The Network page opens.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER, and then press the up/down arrow buttons **AV** to select DDNS. Using the mouse, click DDNS. The DDNS properties are displayed.

# System Menu Setup

The DX4500/DX4600 system settings should be configured before the unit is put into service. Some of the settings affect how video data is stored and backed up, and how the unit is operated and administered from a remote client application.

- **Date/Time:** Establishes the time frame for configuring recording schedules and automated backup. Also provides the time stamp for recorded video, mail and emergency notification.
- Network Time Protocol (NTP): Allows you to use a public or private time server.
- User: Allows you to create user accounts for local and remote system operation and administration.
- **Update:** Supports updating DX4500/DX4600 software over the network.
- **Backup:** Schedules the automatic backup of recorded video.

The DX4500/DX4600 must be turned on, connected to a network, and you must be logged on at the administrator level to configure network software settings. You must restart the DVR for any network configuration changes to take effect. Be sure you are not recording video that cannot be interrupted before you change the network settings.

1. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight the System menu option. Using the mouse, click system menu options. The System options are displayed.




Figure 70. System Menu

### DATE AND TIME

The System menu contains the Date/Time configuration option.

- Date: Sets the date and establishes the DVR's internal calendar for all recorded video.
- **Time:** Sets the system time and establishes the time for all recorded video.
- Date Format: Selects the date format for the displayed date and establishes the saved video format as it is recorded. Choices are MM/DD/YYYY, DD/MM/YYYY, and YYYY/MM/DD.
- **Time Format:** Sets the display time format and establishes the format that is saved video format as it is recorded. Choices are 12-and 24-hour time format.
- **Time Zone:** Selects the time zone in which the DX4500/DX4600 is located. Time zones are determined based on the number of hours by which they are offset from the Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).
- Daylight Saving: Ensures that recorded video displays the correct time, reflecting the annual change to daylight saving time. Select this
  setting if the DX4500/DX4600 is located in a state or country that observes daylight saving time.

You must configure daylight saving time on both the DX4500/DX4600 and the computer on which the remote client application is running. Configure the time zone on the remote client system, using the System menu in the Setup window. For information about configuring the time zone on the remote client PC, refer to the client operation manual.



- Daylight Saving OFF: By default, the Daylight Saving feature is set to OFF. In this case, there is no change in the system time stamp for recorded data throughout the year. The effective date is set using the Date, Time, Date Format, and Time Zone options.
- Daylight Saving OFF, but later changed to ON: For example, the DVR is installed in a location where DST is already in observance and the DVR's time is set to the local time. Sometime in the future, the Daylight Savings option is set to ON. In this case, there is no change in the system time stamp for recorded data. When the Daylight Saving End date and time occur, the unit's time goes back one hour.

Example: Based on Pacific time zone (GMT-8)

### NTP

The internal time of the DX4500/DX4600 can be synchronized with an external time source using the NTP Date/Time configuration option.

• **NTP:** Sychronizes the DVR's time. This feature must be enabled before the NTP server is selected.

**NOTE:** If the NTP option is set to ON, the Date/Time option is unavailable.

- Server: Allows you to select a public or private NTP server. The default setting is PUBLIC SERVER. In this case the DVR averages the time of five public servers: rime.nist.gov, time-a.nist.gov, timeb. nist.gov, ntp.nasa.gov, and clock.isc.org.
- Private Time Server: Allows you to enter the IP address of a private NTP server. The server setting must be set to PRIVATE SERVER for the field to be available.
- **Time Sync. interval:** Sychronizes the DVR with the NTP server based on the following intervals: every hour (1 HOUR), daily (1 DAY), weekly (1 WEEK), monthly (1 MONTH). The default setting is 1 DAY.
- NTP Test: Verifies the system sychronization with the NTP server.
- 1. From the System menu, on the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Then press the up/down arrow buttons **T** to highlight NTP. Using the mouse, click the NTP option. The NTP settings are displayed.

# SOUND

- Alarm: If set to ON, the system continues to beep approximately once per second until the alarm event is acknowledged.
- Motion: If set to ON, the system continues to beep approximately once per second until the alarm event is acknowledged.
- System: If set to ON, the system beeps when a system action occurs.

# **USER ACCOUNTS**

User accounts are administered locally on the server or remotely over the network using the client application. A user account consists of three items:

• ID: The user name is created by the system administrator. The default is ADMINISTRATOR ID.

The user name has the following guidelines:

- Characters: A to Z, a to z, numerals 0 to 9, and special characters.
- Name length: Up to 23 characters.
- Level: The three user levels are administrator, power, and normal; the user is assigned a level when the account is created. Table D describes the user levels and permissions granted to each level.
- **Password:** Login user password created by the system administrator. The default administrator password is 000000, but it can be changed. The password has the following guidelines:
  - **Characters:** A to Z, a to z, numerals 0 to 9, and special characters.
  - **Password length:** Must be between 4 to 8 characters long.

The DX4500/DX4600 supports 10 user accounts including the default administrator account.

# **SOFTWARE UPDATE**

The DX4500/DX4600 Update feature allows you to upgrade DVR software and add or upgrade PTZ protocols. The current DVR settings are not deleted or replaced during the update process.

You can perform an update from either the USB drive or the network server.

- USB drive:
  - All USB devices, except the USB device containing the update file, must be disconnected before you can use the USB drive.
  - Format the USB drive using the DVR erase media utility before start the update process.
  - If the system cannot find a valid update file, the "Cannot find valid update file." message is displayed. In this case, ensure that there
    are valid update files placed in the root directory of the USB drive and repeat the procedure.

NOTE: The upgrade file must be placed in the USB drive's root directory.

- If the system finds a valid update file, the "S/W update is in progress." message is displayed.

### • Network server:

- The DVR network settings must be configured. You must know the update server's IP address to configure the settings.
- If the update server IP address is not configured, the "Change update server to Update Server for all entries." message is displayed.
- If the incorrect update server IP address is configured or the system cannot located the update server, the "Update Server access failed" message is displayed.
- If the system finds a valid update server and file, the "S/W update is in progress." message is displayed.
- 1. From the System menu, on the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Then press the up/down arrow buttons **T** to highlight Update. Using the mouse, click the Update option. The Update settings are displayed.




Figure 80. Restart the System Dialog Box

  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight Configuration Export, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click the Configuration Export settings box. The "Would You Like to Export the Configuration?" dialog box. opens.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  to highlight OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. After export process is finished, the Configuration Export Complete dialog box opens.
  - c. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$  to highlight OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK.

4. To reset the DVR to factory defaults:

**NOTE:** Setting the DVR to factory defaults deletes the customized settings. To save the customized settings, be sure to perform a configuration export before resetting the DVR to the factory defaults.

a. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight Factory Defaults, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click the Configuration Export settings box. The "Reset DVR to factory default configuration?" dialog box opens.




Figure 83. Reset DVR Dialog Box

b. Press the left/right arrow buttons 
on the front panel or remote control to highlight OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. The DVR configuration is reset to factory defaults.

### **HARD DISK**

The DX4500/DX4600 allows you to configure how the system administers hard disk storage.

The DVR combines the storage space of multiple HDDs into one large disk and creates two partitions: TEMP and DATA. The system allocates 6 GB of disk space to the TEMP partition; the remaining space is allocated to the DATA partition. When the HDDs are formatted, the system creates two folders (Normal and Event) based on the Event Partition settings. A percentage of space is allocated to the Event folder (the default setting is 50 percent); the remaining storage capacity is allocated to the Normal folder.

If the Event Partition setting is changed, the system forces a reformatting of all drives and re-allocates the space to the Normal and Event folder based on the new event partition percentage.

NOTE: The terms normal partition and event partition are used when referencing the normal folder and the event folder.

- Format: Initializes all installed HDDs. The System Information dialog box lists the installed drives and their respective capacities. If a drive is installed, the system prompts you to format the drive and all data on the drive(s) is erased.
- Overwrite:
  - ALL: When the normal and event partitions are full, the system will begin overwriting. The oldest recorded data is overwritten first. The default setting is ALL.
  - NORMAL PARTITION: When the normal partition is full, the system will begin overwriting only the normal partition. The oldest
    recorded data is overwritten first.
  - EVENT PARTITION: When the event partition is full, the system will begin overwriting only the event partition. The oldest recorded data is overwritten first.
  - OFF: Blocks the overwriting of any partition.
- **Full Warning:** When the HDD has reached the configured percentage capacity, the system displays a warning message. The default setting is OFF.
- **Event Partition (size):** Specifies the percentage of the total hard disk space allocated for storing event-related recorded video. The remaining disk space is allocated for storing instant recorded video and continuous recorded video.

/ WARNING: If you change the event partition setting, the system will reformat all of the hard drives. All recorded video will be erased.

Auto Delete: Allows you to configure when the DVR automatically deletes all data from the HDDs (OFF, 1 DAY, 2 DAYS, 5 DAYS, 10 DAYS, 20 DAYS, 30 DAYS, 40 DAYS, 50 DAYS, 60 DAYS). The default setting is OFF.

### FORMATTING THE SYSTEM DRIVES

**NOTE:** The default setting is ALL. The settings box can be accessed, but it cannot be changed. If a new drive is installed, the system only formats the newly installed drive; the current drives are not reformatted.

1. From the System menu, on the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Then press the up/down arrow buttons **t** to highlight Hard Disk. Using the mouse, click the Hard Disk option. The hard drive settings are displayed.

The "Formatting the HDD will delete all existing data." virtual keyboard opens.

- a. Type **YES** to start the formatting process. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons **I b b c b c** to highlight the first character of the word, and then press ENTER. Repeat this process to enter the remaining characters. Using the mouse, click each character.
- b. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft \triangleright \land \lor$  to highlight OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. After the hard drives are formatted, the "Restart the system." dialog box is displayed.
- c. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. The system restarts.

- 2. Configure the overwrite setting.

    - (2) Press the up/down arrow buttons  $\blacktriangle \nabla$  to highlight Overwrite, and then press ENTER.
  - Using the mouse, click the overwrite settings box.

The settings box changes color.

- a. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons 
  to display the desired setting. Using the mouse, click the settings box.
- b. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse, click Overwrite. The settings box changes color.

- 3. Configure the full warning limit.
  - a. On the front panel or remote, press the up/down arrow buttons **AV** to highlight Full Warning, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click the Full Warning settings box. The settings box changes color.
  - b. On the front panel or remote, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$  to display the desired setting. Using the mouse, click the settings box.
  - c. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Using the mouse, click Full Warning. The settings box changes color.
- 4. To configure the event partition size, repeat the procedure in step 3.
- 5. To configure the auto delete feature, repeat procedure in step 3.

### BACKUP

The DX4500/DX4600 backup feature allows you to perform an instant backup of recorded data or configure the system to perform an automatic backup of data on a scheduled basis. The administrator or power user has permissions for setting up and conducting backup procedures.

The DX4500/DX4600 backup feature allows you to schedule how the DVR backs up recorded video data.

- **Partition Selection:** Allows you to specify the type of data to be backed up: all (instant, normal, and event [alarm/motion]), normal (instant and normal), or event (alarm and motion).
- Device: Indicates the destination backup media. The DVR determines what media is available and displays those media as options. If a
  USB device is installed, the system displays the manufacturer's name of the device. (for example, a ClipDrive or Flash Drive). Table E
  describes the guidelines for backing up data to various media.
- Schedule: Specifies the backup period.
  - **OFF:** Disables the backup feature.
  - **Daily:** Schedules daily backups between the start and end time
  - Weekly: Schedules weekly backups, allowing you to specify different start and end times for each day of the week.
  - Instant: Allows you to manually backup data by specifying the date and the start and end time.
- Schedule Start: Specifies the day and time (in hours and minutes) the scheduled backup begins.
- Time Range Date: Defines the date the backup process begins.
- Time Range Start: Indicates the time the backup process begins.
- Time Range End: Indicates the time the backup process ends.

You cannot use the Estimate Size, Start Backup, or Erase Media options while the backup process is running.

The USB device should not be removed while the backup process is running. Doing so can disrupt the formatting of the USB drive. If the USB is removed, it will have to be reformatted to work properly.

# SYSTEM IR REMOTE ID AND USER LOGOUT

### **IR REMOTE ID**

The DX4500/DX4600 infrared (IR) ID feature allows you to transmit a unique IR Remote ID (01–09) from the remote control to one or more DVRs. Each DVR that is preconfigured with the transmitted ID is enabled to respond to and be operated by the remote control. All DVRs with a different ID are disabled from responding to the remote control but are not disabled from normal operation.

NOTE: For proper operation and control, all IR receivers must be in the line of sight of the remote control (refer to the following examples).

- For example, you have two DVRs: Lobby and Front Entrance. Both are in the line of sight of the remote control. Lobby is preconfigured for IR Remote ID 02 and Front Entrance is preconfigured for ID 03.
  - If the remote control transmits ID 02, Lobby is enabled to respond to the remote control and Front Entrance is disabled from responding.
  - If the remote control transmits ID 03 to both DVRs, Front Entrance is enabled to respond to the remote control and Lobby is disabled from responding.
- For example, Front Entrance (which was previously enabled) is not in the line of sight of the remote control but Lobby is in its line of sight. The remote control transmits ID 02.
  - Front Entrance remains enabled because it did not receive the IR transmission. It continues to respond to remote control commands intended for Lobby.
  - Lobby is enabled and responds to the remote control.
- 1. From the System menu, on the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Then press the up/down arrow buttons **A V** to highlight the System option. Using the mouse, click System. The system settings are displayed.

- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER twice. Using the mouse, click the IR Remote ID settings box. The settings box changes color.
- 3. Change the DVR IR remote ID.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$  to display the desired ID. Using the mouse, click the settings box.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press ENTER to select the setting. Using the mouse, click IR Remote ID. The settings box changes color.
- 4. Save the changes.
  - a. Do one of the following:
    - On the front panel, press the MENU/ESC button or press the MENU/ESC button or the remote control until the "Configuration data is changed. Save the new settings message?" dialog box is displayed.
    - Using the mouse, click Exit. The "Configuration data is changed. Save the new settings?" dialog box is displayed.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  to highlight OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. The changes are saved and the Live View mode is displayed.

5. To transmit an IR Remote ID from the remote control to the DVRs, ensure that the units are in the line of sight of the remote control and do the following:

NOTE: This step requires a quick response when programming the remote control.

- a. On the remote control, press the ID button. Within two seconds, press a number representing the DVR's IR remote ID. The system beeps.
- b. To verify the remote control is communicating with the selected DVR, press MENU/ESC. The Setup window is displayed.

### **AUTO USER LOGOUT**

You can configure the DX4500/DX4600 to automatically log off users.

1. From the System menu, on the front panel or remote control, press ENTER. Then press the up/down arrow buttons **AV** to highlight the System option. Using the mouse, click System. The System settings are displayed.

# **Live Video**


After the DX4500/DX4600 is installed and cameras are attached, the DVR starts and immediately begins displaying live video; the DVR is also configured to record video immediately after starting. By default, the recording mode is configured for alarm and motion recording.

Log on to the system.

1. On the front panel or remote control, press the Login button 🙎 . Using the mouse, click the Login icon 🙎 . The virtual keyboard is

displayed. The default user name is admin. The cursor highlights the first character on the virtual keyboard.

- 2. Select your user name.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press the up/down arrow buttons **AV** to highlight the user name settings box. Using the mouse, click the User Name settings box.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press the left/right arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$  > to display your user name. Using the mouse, click the settings box.
- 3. Enter your password.

  - Using the mouse, click each character of the password.
- 4. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons ◀ ► ▲▼ to select OK, and then press ENTER. Using the mouse, click OK. The system logs you on and the Login icon \_ changes color, indicating that you have successfully logged on to the DVR.

# **INSTANT RECORD AND PLAYBACK**

The instant record feature allows you to start a manual recording session immediately from the live view mode. Initiate the instant record mode for channels that are scheduled for normal, alarm, or motion record mode. Instant record is the highest priority recording event.

Observe the following instant record conditions:

- Instant (or normal) recording cannot start if the following conditions exist:
  - Video loss is displayed for the channel.
  - Overwrite is set to OFF and the hard disk normal partition storage space is full.
  - The normal record mode is not available. If the event partition is set to 100 percent, the normal record mode is disabled because hard disk space for storing normal record video is not available.
- The partition (folder) used by each recording mode:
  - Normal partition: Video recorded in the instant and normal record mode is stored in the normal folder. If the normal folder is set to 0 (zero) percent (the event partition is 100 percent), the DVR will not operate in the instant or normal record mode.
  - Event partition: Video recorded in the alarm and motion record mode is stored in the event partition. If the event partition is set to 0 (zero) percent, the DVR will not operate in the alarm or motion record mode.

For information about how hard drive storage is organized, refer to Playback Video on page 111.

Instant, normal, alarm, and motion recording mode priority.

The instant playback feature allows you to simultaneously play back video and record live video.

### STARTING AND STOPPING INSTANT RECORD

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press REC and the channel number. Using the mouse, click the camera's recording indicator (N). The recording indicator immediately changes to the Instant Record indicator (1).
- 2. To stop instant record, on the front panel or remote control, press REC and the channel number. Using the mouse, click the Instant Record indicator (1) The recording indicator immediately changes to the scheduled recording mode.

### **INSTANT PLAYBACK**

The DX4500/DX4600 supports two playback modes, instant playback and playback. Instant playback is accessed from the live view mode and allows you to simultaneously play back and record video from the selected channel. Playback is displayed in picture-in-picture (PIP) presentation in a separate pane. For information about the playback mode, refer to Playback Video on page 111.

Instant playback mode contains the following features:

- Playback: Video is only played back for one channel at a time, starting in the forward direction.
- Playback controls: All controls are available.
- Timing: Playback can be configured to begin two minutes prior to the start of an event.

Instant playback has the following conditions:

- Played back video is viewed separately from the live video being recorded. Use the zoom controls to adjust the size of the playback video view pane (1x, 4x, and full size).
- The playback pane can be moved to another location in the application window.
- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a**  $\checkmark$  to select a camera pane. Using the mouse, click a camera pane. A red border highlights the selected pane.
- 2. To initiate instant playback, on the front panel or remote control, press the play button . Using the mouse, click the play button . The DVR displays playback video.
- 3. To view the playback video and live video simultaneously, on the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons

The PIP pane relocates, and you can view playback and live video simultaneously.

4. To return to the live view mode, on the front panel or remote control, press STOP. Using the mouse, click the stop button

### **PTZ IN LIVE VIEW**

The DX4500/DX4600 displays a PTZ control for operating and administering cameras that support PTZ functions using Pelco C, Pelco P, and D protocols. PTZ control is also available for supported third-party dome cameras. The PTZ option must be configured for each camera channel.

- Programming: To program or clear presets, preset tours, and patterns, the SET icon must be engaged. While in PTZ programming mode, multiple presets can be programmed.
- Activating a PTZ feature: To activate presets, tours, and patterns, the SET icon must be disengaged. The PTZ option must be configured for each camera channel before the PTZ control is used to operate the camera. You must have administrator level permissions to configure DX4500/DX4600 features. For information about setting up PTZ options, refer to PTZ Setup on page 29.
- The PTZ feature is available to administrator, power, and normal level users.
- No other DVR operation, other than those initiated using the PTZ control, is available when the PTZ control is displayed.
- If someone is controlling a PTZ camera using the DVR, you cannot use the PTZ function and vice versa.
- The DVR will not perform instant record when the PTZ control is displayed.
- The PTZ control has a drag and drop feature.
- The PTZ control opens in the last location in which it was used.

You can also use the Pelco KBD300A keyboard to configure and operate PTZ devices. For information about configuring PTZ features, refer to PTZ Presets on page 101. For information about working with the KBD300A keyboard, to configure and operate PTZ devices, refer to Working With PTZ Devices Using the KBD300A Keyboard on page 99. For information about the PTZ control and a description of its buttons, refer to PTZ Control on page 15.

3. On the front panel or remote control, press the preset number, and then press SHIFT + PRESET. Using the mouse, click the number pad on the PTZ control, and then click PRESET. The camera moves to the preset location.

### **ACTIVATING PATTERNS**

A pattern is a user-defined, viewable camera path with a specified beginning and end. Patterns are made up of a sequence of standard pan/tilt and lens commands. Patterns are stored in the internal memory of the PTZ device, such as a Spectra<sup>®</sup> dome, connected to the DX4500/DX4600. Spectra III<sup>™</sup> supports one pattern and the Spectra III SE supports up to four unique PTZ patterns. Depending on the type and configuration of the PTZ device, the DX4500/DX4600 can address up to four unique PTZ patterns. Once defined, a pattern can be activated with a series of on-screen commands and will run continuously until it is deactivated.

To activate a pattern:

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a**  $\nabla$  to select a camera pane. Using the mouse, click a camera pane.
- 2. On the front panel or on the remote control, press PTZ. Using the mouse, click the PTZ button Term. The PTZ control is displayed.
- 3. On the front panel or remote control, press the pattern number, and then press SHIFT + PATTERN. Using the mouse, click the number pad on the PTZ control, and then click PATTERN. The pattern runs.

### **SENDING AUXILIARY COMMANDS TO A DEVICE**

The DX4500/DX4600 auxiliary feature allows you to control external equipment connected to the auxiliary outputs of Spectra domes or Esprit<sup>®</sup> positioning systems. The auxiliary function is implemented through Pelco D and Pelco P protocols.

The AUX key selects the auxiliary mode. Buttons 1-4 select the camera's auxiliary outputs and operate as an on/off toggle.

For example, an Esprit equipped with a wiper uses Aux 1 to control the wiper. In this case, sending an AUX 1 command to the Esprit operates the wiper. You must configure the camera to establish how the camera responds to an auxiliary command. For detailed information about how a specific Spectra or Esprit camera system interprets auxiliary commands, refer to the documentation that accompanies the camera system.

To send an Aux 1 command to operate the wiper on an Esprit:

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a v** to select a PTZ camera. Using the mouse, click the camera.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control press PTZ. Using the mouse, click the PTZ button Term. The PTZ control is displayed.
- 3. Enter the PTZ programming mode.
  - On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET.
  - On the remote control, press SET.
  - Using the mouse, click SET.
- 4. Send an AUX 1 command.
  - On the front panel, press SHIFT + AUX, and then press 1.
  - On the remote control, press AUX, and then press 1.
  - Using the mouse, click AUX, and then click 1.

The wiper operates one cycle.

### **PTZ PRESETS**

A preset is a user-defined camera position using PTZ and focus commands (the camera's auto focus option must be turned off). The DX4500/ DX4600 preset range is 0–255. For information about the number of presets supported by a given camera, refer to the documentation supplied with the camera.

### **Programming a Preset**

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft \triangleright \land \nabla$  to select a PTZ camera pane. Using the mouse, click a camera pane.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press PTZ. Using the mouse, click the PTZ button TT. The PTZ control is displayed.
- 3. Position, zoom, and focus the camera.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a v** to move the camera. Using the mouse, click the Move buttons  $\frac{r + v}{r + v}$ .
  - b. On the front panel, press SHIFT + ZOOM or remote control, press ZOOM. Using the mouse, click ZOOM.
  - c. On the front panel, press SHIFT + FOCUS- or FOCUS+. On the remote control, press FOCUS. Using the mouse, click FOCUS.
- 4. Store the preset to a memory location.
  - a. On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET or remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET. The camera is now in the programming mode.
  - b. On the front panel or remote control, press a number representing the preset memory location. Using the mouse, click a number on the keypad.
  - c. On the front panel, press SHIFT + PRESET. On the remote control, press PRESET. Using the mouse, click PRESET. The camera's position, zoom factor, and focus setting are stored to the memory location.
- 5. Do one of the following:
  - To create multiple presets for the same camera, repeat steps 3 and 4.
  - To exit the programming mode, on the front panel, press SHIFT + SET. On the remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET.

- 6. Verify that you can activate the preset.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b b c v** to move the camera to another location. Using the mouse, click the Move buttons  $\boxed{\frac{1}{1}}$ .
  - b. If you changed the camera's zoom or focus, verify that the settings are different than the preset settings.
  - c. Do one of the following:
    - On the front panel, press the preset number, and then press SHIFT + PRESET.
    - On the remote control, press the preset number, and then press PRESET.
    - Using the mouse, click the preset number, and then click PRESET.

The camera performs the programmed preset.

### **Preset Tours**

A preset tour allows a camera to move through a programmed sequence of PTZ presets. The DX4500/DX4600 tour advances sequentially through presets 1–16. There is approximately a four-second pause between the end of the current preset and the start of the next preset. If the presets are programmed sequentially (1, 2, 3, 4, and so forth), the time period between presets is brief. If one or more of the presets are not programmed sequentially, the time period between the start of the next can be longer, because the system still accounts for the four-second interval for the non programmed preset memory location. For example, if presets 1 and 2 are programmed and presets 3–16 are not programmed, the system waits approximately 54 seconds before starting preset 1.

A preset tour will operate continuously until another PTZ control action is performed. At least one PTZ preset must be set in order to create a preset tour.

To activate a preset tour:

1. Click the PRESET button without entering a preset number. This activates a preset tour for all PTZ-enabled cameras.

### **Clearing a Preset**

- 1. On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET. On the remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET.
- 2. On the front panel, press SHIFT + PRESET. On the remote control, press PRESET. Using the mouse, click PRESET.
- 3. On the front panel or remote control, press a number representing the preset memory location. Using the mouse, click a number.
- 4. On the front panel, press SHIFT + CLR. On the remote control, press CLR. Using the mouse, click CLR. The preset is cleared from the camera's memory.

### **PTZ PATTERNS**

### **Programming a Pattern**

- 1. On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET or remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET. The camera is now in the programming mode.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press a number representing the pattern (1–4). Using the mouse, click a number.
- 3. On the front panel, press SHIFT + PATTERN. On the remote control, press PATTERN. Using the mouse, click PATTERN.

(Certain PTZ devices, such as Pelco's Spectra series domes, will display an on-screen message with the amount of remaining memory available for pattern programming.)

- 4. Move the camera through a series of movements using the on-screen PTZ and focus controls.
  - a. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\checkmark$  **b a v** to move the camera. Using the mouse, click the Move buttons  $\frac{r + v}{t + v}$ .
  - b. On the front panel, press SHIFT + ZOOM or remote control, press ZOOM. Using the mouse, click ZOOM.
  - c. On the front panel, press SHIFT + FOCUS- or FOCUS+. On the remote control, press FOCUS. Using the mouse, click FOCUS.
- 5. Stop programming the pattern.
  - a. On the front panel, press SHIFT + PATTERN. On the remote control, press PATTERN. Using the mouse, click PATTERN.
  - b. On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET. On the remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET.

- 6. Verify the pattern can be activated.
  - On the front panel, press the pattern number, and then press SHIFT + PATTERN.
  - On the remote control, press the patter number, and then press PATTERN.
  - Using the mouse, click the pattern number, and then click PATTERN.

The pattern executes.

7. To stop the pattern, on the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft$   $\blacktriangleright$   $\blacktriangle$ . Using the mouse, click the Move

buttons  $\begin{bmatrix} r & r \\ \hline r & r \\ r & r \\ \hline r & r \\ r & r \\ \hline r & r \\$ 

### **Clearing a Pattern**

- 1. On the front panel, press SHIFT + SET. On the remote control, press SET. Using the mouse, click SET.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press a number representing the preset memory location. Using the mouse, click a number.
- 3. On the front panel, press SHIFT + PATTERN. On the remote control, press PATTERN. Using the mouse, click PATTERN.
- 4. On the front panel, press SHIFT + CLR. On the remote control, press CLR. Using the mouse, click CLR. The preset is cleared from the camera's memory.

### ACCESSING PROGRAMMING FEATURES OF A REMOTE CAMERA

You can use the PTZ function to program features of cameras, such as Pelco's Spectra or Esprit. Only cameras that support remote programming through Pelco D, Pelco P, or supported third-party protocols can use this feature.

Access the camera programming menu for a PTZ camera.

- 1. On the front panel or remote control, press any of the arrow buttons  $\blacktriangleleft \triangleright \blacktriangle \forall$  to select a PTZ camera pane. Using the mouse, click a camera pane.
- 2. On the front panel or remote control, press PTZ. Using the mouse, click the PTZ button Trans. The PTZ control is displayed.




Figure 103. Camera Setup Menu

# **COPYING AND EXPORTING VIDEO**

The DX4500/DX4600 allows you to copy and export recorded video from the hard drive to an external storage device (USB drive, CD, and DVD±RW). For information about copying and exporting video, refer to Exporting Video on page 126.

### **ACKNOWLEDGING AN ALARM OR MOTION EVENT**

The DX4500/DX4600 allows you to manually acknowledge an event state that has activated a relay output. By default, the DVR's output relay is turned off at a time commensurate with expiration of the post-alarm time. Acknowledging an alarm or motion event does not end the alarm or motion event recording. The post-alarm time (configured under that Record menu) determines the time period for alarm recording. For information about configuring the relay off setting, refer to Relay Outputs on page 56. For information about configuring the post-alarm time, refer to Schedule Menu Setup on page 37.

The alarm acknowledged feature contains the following:

- **Output:** A relay associated with a channel and linked to an alarm input. If the relay is configured for alarm acknowledged, the relay output is activated until it is manually deactivated.
- Sound alerts: The system menu includes the sound option that enables a sound alert in response to an unacknowledged event.
- Visible indicators The alarm and motion event displays an indicator in the camera pane. The indicator is visible for the length of time set by the post-alarm time.
- **Remote notification:** Mail notification and emergency notification are used to alert the remote user that an event has occurred. When viewing the remote client application, and event is not physically evidenced by the display of alarm or motion indicators.

To acknowledge an event, do one of the following:

- On the front panel, press SHIFT + ALM.OFF.
- On the remote control, press ALM.OFF.
- Using the mouse, click the Alarm OFF button

The event is acknowledged and the relay output is deactivated. If sound is enabled, it is turned off.

# Main and Spot Monitors MAIN MONITOR

# **SELECTING THE MAIN VIDEO OUTPUT MONITORS**

The main video output can be displayed on a VGA or analog monitor; video cannot be displayed on both monitors simultaneously. By default, main video is displayed through the VGA connector. In this case, if a VGA monitor is connected to the VGA connector, video from the DVR is displayed on the monitor.

The main or spot monitor can only be selected through the DX4500/DX4600 front panel.

### **DISPLAYING VIDEO ON THE ANALOG MONITOR**

To change the video display from the VGA monitor to the analog monitor:

- 2. Turn on the analog monitor (the power source must be AC 100~240V, 50/60Hz).
- 3. On the front panel, press and hold the SPOT button. After approximately five seconds, the system will beep and restart.
- 4. Verify the main video display on the analog monitor.

# **DISPLAYING VIDEO ON THE VGA MONITOR**

To change the video display from the analog monitor to the VGA monitor:

- 1. Connect the VGA monitor to the VGA connector.
- 2. Turn on the monitor.
- 3. On the front panel, press and hold the MAIN button. After approximately five seconds the system will beep and restart.
- 4. Verify the main video display on the VGA monitor.

## **INFORMATION**

System Information contains both static and dynamic information. You can view the system's model name, serial number, and network IP address without logging on to the unit.

- Static information: Information that does not change including the model name and serial number. Pelco assigns a serial number to each DVR. Use the Pelco serial number when corresponding with Pelco about your unit. The MAC address is an internal number.
- Dynamic information: Video format, TCP/IP settings, software version, and hard disk information.
- 1. To view system information, do one of the following:
  - View the model, serial number, and IP address: Without logging on to the unit, on the front panel, press SHIFT + INFO. Press

## **Playback Video**

The DX4500/DX4600 supports two playback modes: playback and instant playback. The playback mode is accessed from the search window and is used by the search feature to display video resulting from a search operation. Playback video is displayed in PIP presentation in the application window. For information about the instant playback mode, refer to Instant Playback on page 97.

## PLAYBACK VIEW AND CONTROLS

The playback mode has the following conditions:

- **Playback:** By default, playback video is displayed in PIP in the center of the application window. One, four, nine, or sixteen channels can be simultaneously viewed in a custom display. One playback channel is displayed in a single pane, two to four playback channels are displayed in four views, five to nine playback channels are displayed in nine views, and ten or more channels are displayed in sixteen panes across the entire window. When sixteen channels are displayed simultaneously, the playback window cannot be moved and live video cannot be viewed. However, the DVR continues to record video.
- Viewing video: The Client application plays back most, but not all, of the video frames received from the DVR server. Conversely, the DVR server plays back video in it's entirety. Therefore, video played back and viewed on the server, when played back and viewed on the Client, does not include all video frames.
- **Selecting playback panes:** Multiple panes can be selected one at a time in the playback mode. A red border highlights the selected pane.
- **Playback controls:** All playback channels are controlled simultaneously. An operation performed on one channel is automatically performed on all playback channels.
- **Supported search modes:** With exception to the bookmark search feature, the playback mode is available for all other search modes. The bookmark button is unavailable if an external backup device is selected.
- DVR operation: Recorded video can be viewed in the playback mode while simultaneously viewing and recording live video.
- Timing: Playback can be configured to begin two minutes prior to the start of an event.

In summary, to playback video:

- 1. Open the search window.
- 2. Search a channel for data.
- 3. From the search window, start playback. The playback video is displayed in PIP presentation.
- 4. Use the front panel, remote control buttons, or mouse to work with the PIP presentation.

Playback Video Pane: Displays video in a picture-in-picture (PIP) presentation, which can overlap the source channel pane.

- Depending on the number of channels, PIP views can be displayed in 1, 4, 9, and 16 format.
- Press the zoom buttons on the front panel or remote control to enlarge or reduce the PIP pane by 1x, 4x, or full screen.

2 Recording Indicator: Indicates motion recording mode.

**Channel:** Displays live video simultaneously and independently of the channel's playback video being displayed in a separate pane.

## **DST DATE/TIME SEARCH**

If the DX4500/DX4600 is configured for DST, the DVR uses a different approach to store and display video. When DST is set to OFF, the DVR's internal time automatically adjusts backward one hour. Video is time-stamped and recorded one hour before and one hour after the time change. When DST is set to ON, the DVR's internal time automatically adjusts forward one hour and the unit records normally.

The Date/Time search feature allows you to view video recorded before and after a DST time change (refer to Figure 115). For example, the DVR is configured for DST to end at 2:00 p.m. on November 4, 2007. The time period between column 01 and column 02 for channel 1 is partitioned into two sections: the upper section represents video recorded when DST is set to ON, the bottom section represents video recorded when DST is set to OFF.




Figure 114. Video Recorded Before and After DST Changed




Figure 116. Date/Time Search Results




Figure 118. Timeline Position in DST Time Period
